As Lutherans, we have a teaching called 'The Two Kingdoms'. God rules the world thru two kingdoms in two ways: the kingdom of the left (civil authority / earthly government) for the purpose of maintaining earthly law & order and promoting the public good (temporal matters); and the kingdom of the right (spiritual authority / church) for delivering spiritual needs, forgiveness and faith (eternal matters). We recognize that the church should not tell the government how to govern, nor should the government put any restrictions on the church.

Which kingdom is more important? Clearly eternal matters are way more important. As a church body we stay above the fray of dirty politics. God belongs to neither party, and we remain a-political. Our church does not advocate nor endorse any political party nor candidate: after all there are moral and ethical issues on all sides. That being said, there are some issues that the church does engage in, based on scripture (such as religious liberty and freedom (Acts 5:29, Dan 6:7-10), and God being a God of life (Ps 139:13-14, Ps 51:5)).

Yes, earthly temporal matters are also important. After all, we desire to live in a society of peace and order; we desire justice for those who have been wronged; we wish to have the freedom and ability to worship God unimpeded. The Rev. Joel Biermann wrote an excellent article in the August Lutheran Witness titled 'Beyond the Booth'. ( https:// witness.lcms.org/2020/beyond-thebooth) Within the article he said this: "God most certainly goes with you into the voting booth and has something to say about the ballot you cast... God wants you to vote for the people, principles and platforms that will uphold and advance his justice in the world. In oth-

er words, you should

vote in ways that will best serve your neighbor and his needs." He then goes on to explain that upholding the needs of our neighbor, protecting human life, and respecting the dignity of all humans are more important than animals, or stuff, or 'rights'.

Yes, as Christians, we have the opportunity and the responsibility to vote. Remember that God is a God of order not chaos, a God of life not death, and a God of dignity and respect not contempt. But then after you vote, remember what is most important. Paul said: "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures." (1 Cor 15:3-4) Of first importance: the gospel message about Jesus!

Being a child of God, recognizing our sin (all of us), and living in the forgiveness and love of Christ, is WAY MORE IMPORTANT than an election. Jesus came to reconcile you with God. He loves each of you very much. He also loves those you disagree with as well. We all need to live in the grace and mercy of Jesus Christ and rise above the sinful disputes of this world.






### **LWML OCTOBER GRANT**

Touching the Living Word—Lutheran Braille Workers



The mission of Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) is to passionately reach out to people who are blind and visually impaired with the Good News of Jesus Christ as their Savior. In the United States, there are nearly 11 million people who are blind or visually impaired and over 36 million people worldwide. Of this number, it is estimated that more than 94 percent are unchurched. The braille Bible has 37 volumes; each volume has 90 pages. A zinc plate is produced via a plate embossing device (PED) which enables pages to be printed. Multiple plates are needed to print one Bible. The mites raised for this grant will help LBW to purchase a new PED to produce the zinc plates. With the new equipment and new technology, LBW will be able to better meet worldwide demand for Bibles in multiple languages. For more information, go to www.lwml.org/2019-2021-

### CLS BAND PROGRAM NEEDS YOUR HELP!

At the Voter's Meeting on Monday, Sept. 21, members were informed of the suspension of the band program until the end of December. Approximately \$3,500.00 is needed to fund this program during that time.

A family has issued an above and beyond challenge to fund our band program. All donations made by Oct. 5 will be matched up to \$2,000.00. Donations should be given to Christine or Amy in the office.

### Financial Update - August, 2020

For the month of August we ran a deficit of \$6 thousand, leaving us with a two month deficit of \$16 thousand. This compares to a \$33 thousand deficit we ran for the first two months of last year. There has been one more Sunday collection in the current year.

Total receipts for the first two months were \$9 thousand higher than the first two months of last year, with faith promises accounting for most of the increase. General fund memorials, which had significant gifts in both years, are higher this year. Thrivent receipts are off to a slower start than last year.

Spending for the first two months was \$8 thousand lower than the previous year. Administrative spending was \$10 thousand lower than the previous year, with compensation and benefits costs \$7 thousand lower. We did not have the transition expenses related to bringing in a new middle school teacher that we incurred last year. Properties spending was \$1 thousand higher over the first two months due to various repair and maintenance items. Youth expenses had a nearly \$2 thousand credit due to the refund of funds paid for the Higher Things summer conference, which was cancelled over pandemic concerns.

Our general checking account had a \$64 thousand balance at the end of August. At the end of August 2020 our checking account balance was \$5 thousand. \$50 thousand had been borrowed off our line of credit with Church Extension as of the end of last August.

Funds received under the Federal government's PPP forgivable loan program were exhausted in July. It is expected that we will file for loan forgiveness in early September. It is taking the government and participating financial institutions longer to get ready for the stampede of companies filing for forgiveness.
